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CHRISTMAS THOUGHTS by OUR VICAR, TRYSTAN

When we think about Jesus at Christmas time, we must always remember the question: “what will he grow up to be?”

In the comedy film *Talladega Nights* when a family sit around a table and say grace before eating. The dad starts to pray: “Lord baby Jesus, you do not even know a word yet, you are just a little infant, you are just so cuddly”. At that point, the mum cuts in – “Sweetie, you do realise that Jesus grew up”. The dad answers, “yes, but I like the Christmas Jesus best”. The reality is, though, that we don’t get a choice what Jesus we like best. In the gospels, the baby Jesus is all about the grown-up Jesus, and the grown-up Jesus is all about the Jesus who transforms lives **now**.

In fact, everything in the Christmas story that we will be hearing in the coming weeks answers the question – “what will he grow up to be?”:

- * Mary, when she is expecting, talks about Jesus’s future when he will bring good news and freedom to the poor, the oppressed, the downtrodden, and the suffering.
- * The name given to him as a baby, Jesus, tells in Hebrew of someone who would save others.
- * Jesus’s place of birth, Bethlehem, was linked to an expected Messiah who would transform lives.
- * The angels proclaim a message to the shepherds that is the very same message of peace, joy, and hope that Jesus would preach as an adult.
- * Those same shepherds, the first missionaries, then told others of the wonder and glory of this child.
- * The wise men were the first to bow down and worship Jesus.
- * And then, of course, we have the gifts the wise men gave to Jesus, which again point to his future – gold is a symbol of his divinity, frankincense his holiness, and myrrh his suffering and death.

The Christmas story doesn’t let us remain gazing at the baby Jesus, but challenges us to face the teacher Jesus, the loving Jesus, the healer Jesus, the crucified Jesus, the resurrected Jesus.

Every part of Jesus’s story, then, relates to the whole – to his message of hope, love, and peace, and to his death and resurrection. After all, God’s message transcends time. And that’s why Jesus’s church is as much for a 6 year old as it is for a 60 year old, as much for 9 month year old as it is for a 99 year old. God is all about eternity, where every person is precious, whatever their background, whatever their gender, whatever their nationality, whatever their ethnicity, whatever their age.

So, yes, this Christmas we are celebrating a beautiful newborn who couldn’t talk, walk or look after himself. But, in light of eternity and in light of our faith, we remember much more than a cute baby and a quaint story.

At Christmas, we remember a journey that started in the wonder of Bethlehem, but ended up in Jerusalem with the pain of Holy Week and the joy of Easter.

And so when we look at that Christmas baby, we are actually contemplating eternity... because in that baby is hope, in that baby is compassion, in that baby is justice, in that baby is love, in that baby is peace, in that baby is sacrifice, in that baby is joy, in that baby is resurrection.

Christmas Crib by Eleanor Williams

I don't have a tree at Christmas. Instead, I have a crib. Funnily enough, it's thanks to the French Revolution I have this tiny crib, where each figure is less than an inch tall. In 1789, the churches were declared 'the property of the State'; and in 1792, they were closed altogether.

The people of Provence, unable to attend church at Christmas, made diminutive nativity scenes for their homes. They did so at risk of the guillotine, which is why the cribs were made to be small and easily hidden away. They comprised the traditional Mary, Joseph and Jesus with local Provencal characters – a lady selling flowers, a baker, a mayor, someone scaling a fish, sharpening a knife, lighting a lamp, a man with a dancing bear - who were on their way to visit the manger.

Together, they were called 'santons' or 'little saints'. Every year, when I come to put my set out, I do find myself imagining that I am one of the townspeople on my way to the manger.

Who, I think to myself, are my fellow 'santons'? Who is in my community? Well, this year, of course, there is Christchurch, where I have been stunned by everyone's warmth and friendliness; there are my elderly parents in Newport, and my sister with her family (including my adored nephew, Jonathon) who live in Durham; there is Lucy, a nurse married to a chicken farmer in Monmouth, with whom I was threatened with being expelled from Brownies. She is there with her sons who are my godsons; there is my Auntie Din from Abertillery, who passed on to me her love of literature and travel; there is Ali from school at whose wedding I

was thrilled to speak; there is Miss Thomas, who taught me O level maths (and is therefore a true saint); there is Bill Sykes, my college chaplain, who

taught me that people are the most important;

there is Jo, to whom I dictated my final exams when we were incarcerated in a monastery on Boar's Hill; there is my dear friend Nigel whom I met in the college of law in York, but who hailed from Barry the whole time; there are Girl Guides as I'm an ambassador for their wonderful organisation (they have thankfully overlooked the Brownie incident).

What a diverse lot my 'santons' are! Some on Earth; some not. Some personal; some corporate. Some Christians; some staunch atheists. But all of us, at this time of year, either by attending church or by exchanging presents, or by singing carols, stopping for a look in the stable.
