A letter from our Vicar as we face the covid-19 pandemic

It is an horribly difficult time for everyone at the moment as we face a virus that has the potential to dehumanise and divide. I've spoken to a good number of you on the phone and so I know something of your fear, confusion, and anxiety.

Those in our church who, because of age or medical conditions, are considered high risk are particularly anxious and lonely, cut off from family and friends. And then there are those in our church community who are selflessly working in difficult circumstances – those working in all sorts of roles at the University Hospital of Wales up the road from the church, teachers and head-teachers, shop workers, dentists, vets, carers, and so on. None of us are unaffected by this pandemic – all our lives have changed dramatically, and will stay that way for many more weeks and months.

So, it is times like these that our church needs to show that our faith can face the fear and challenge of this pandemic with Jesus's love, care, compassion, and hope. We want you all to know – you're not alone. We're all in this together and the only way we will get through this is, with God's help, together.

So, Christ Church is doing a number of things to help each other to feel connected, feel loved, feel close to God and to other people.

Firstly, we have a large group of people in Christ Church who are not in a high risk category and have signed up to help with our pastoral care over the next few months. They have offered to keep in touch with those of you who are not able to leave your houses, just to chat with you over the phone or to buy any groceries or collect any medication for you. Please, please do let me know if you haven't heard from anyone in this pastoral care team yet and would like to have conversation or help.

Secondly, Christ Church children and young people have been drawing or painting pictures and then photographing them so I can email them to
